Reminisce, Reconnect, and Have Fun with Friends in Chicago!



After several years without the opportunity to meet in person, Friends of La Leche League is truly excited for our trip to Chicago this October. Chicago is a bustling and modern city, yet steeped in history. Our city explorations begin Friday morning with a guided walking tour of downtown Chicago. We will refuel with a family-style lunch of Chicago-style deep dish pizza, pasta, salad, and dessert. Then we will visit the Chicago Architecture Center and take their relaxing and informative river cruise. On Saturday we will geek out at Chicago's world-class museums, with groups heading to their choice of either the Field Museum of Natural History or the Shedd Aquarium.

But this trip is not only about the highlights and history of Chicago. This location affords us a unique opportunity to celebrate both the history and future of LLLI. We kick off our trip Thursday evening with a reception to honor the authors of *The Art of Breastfeeding*, ninth edition. Registrants can purchase this new edition and have it signed by the authors. We are also offering two optional guided visits to view the LLLI Archives at DePaul University. Due to space limitations, these visits are each limited to the first twelve people to register for them. On Saturday night, trip registrants are welcomed at the LLLI Gala honoring *The Art of Breastfeeding* authors and LLLI Founder Marian Tompson. Planned

as a fundraiser for LLLI, the Gala will be a special evening of connection, with a cash bar cocktail hour, an elegant seated dinner, and a panel discussion with *The Art of Breastfeeding* writers.

Finally, our trip will conclude on Sunday with a bus trip from our hotel to the Chicago suburb of Elmhurst, to explore Wilder Park, the very place where the idea for LLLI was conceived. We will visit the Wilder Park conservatory with its Fall Flower Show. Registrants can take photos at the LLLI commemorative bench and plaque in the park and view the LLL Doll Collection before we convene at the beautiful and historic Wilder Mansion for a seated white-tablecloth meal with a variety of boxed lunch options. Lastly we will have our always moving We Remember Ceremony, in which we will recite the names and remember LLL Leaders whose deaths have been recorded since our last Friends of LLL trip.



We are really looking forward to our trip agenda. We will have time to reminisce about our work as LLL Leaders and have fun in the present. We look forward to reconnecting with old friends and making new ones. Because we expect a higher than usual interest in this trip, we are setting a cap on registrations. Travel Tips

At our last Happy Hour Chat, Evy Simon led a discussion on travel tips. We asked participants ahead of time to think of three “must-haves” for trips. All of us heard about a useful item they had never considered. Here are some of the things people wouldn’t leave home without having or doing.



It's good to plan ahead, of course: check visa requirements and credit card use months in advance (Jo-Anne), buy travel insurance (Alice Ziring, Karen Kerkhoff Gromada), register with the embassy if travelling abroad (Jo-Anne), check your itinerary online and do pre-check-in the day of your flight (Jo-Anne). To make it easier to remember the essentials, Kay Hoover suggested having packing lists for a suitcase and a backpack for the trip, as well as a go-bag (or emergency bag) that is ready at all times. She has also prepared a reusable list of last-minute things to do on travel day, as has Carroll Beckham; you can email Kay at kayhoover697@gmail.com to get a copy of the lists. Marian Tompson reminded us that a list of important items is good for even short trips, while Rebecca Magalhaes has made separate lists for short and long trips. Kay posts pictures to remind her to close the garage door or turn off the

stove in a prominent place, and Marian uses a post-it note on the door to remind her to take her hearing aids. (Evy brings post-it notes with her, too.) Jo-Anne likes to put a plastic bag filled with her toiletries in the place she keeps her toothbrush, so she can put it in her bag as soon as she's brushed her teeth.

Evy suggested taking a picture of your suitcase to make it easier to identify at the airport. Alice Ziring added that you can purchase an Apple Air tag to locate your bag quickly or, as Harriet Smiley suggested, you can tie a colourful scarf tightly around the handle. Nancy Sherwood said you can make or buy personalized suitcase covers made of stretchy material; they may have a unique pattern or custom pictures on them.

For mobility, consider a wheelchair even if you don't usually need one, and bring your cane or walker in case you are standing longer than expected (Nancy Sherwood). If you use a C-Pap, remember to bring it and all its parts (Nancy). And for health and hygiene, a piece of an aloe plant (Evy), ChapStick (Evy),

antiseptic wipes for everything in the hotel room (Rae Schopp), cleaning supplies in a plastic bag (Sandy), and sheets of soap to cut in plastic bags (Charlene Burnett) are practical.

Many participants focused on carry-on items: a plastic bag with pouches for toiletries that will make it easier at security (Evy); a lanyard with a small bag to carry your ID, passport, phone, boarding pass, and \$20 (Nancy and Sandy); a Nexus card and enhanced driver's license (Alice); a Global Entry card and/or TFS pre-check (Harriet); a handicap tag to use in any car (check laws outside the US, but many countries allow the international symbol) (Nancy); chargers for all your devices (Rae); change or small bills in your pocket for tips; finally, a password directory to go with your laptop (Rebecca). Medication should be carried with you in the original prescription containers; even if you are traveling for a few days, it is good to bring enough medication for a week in carry-on. Medication bottles can be put in a plastic bag fastened with elastics (Rebecca). You may also want to bring a double of your medications in your suitcase and a list of numbers (passport number, driver's license number, credit card number and phone number in case it is lost, etc.) on an index card in your suitcase (Alice and Charlene). In fact, it's safer to have two of everything essential, such as eyeglasses (Rebecca) in cases with your name on them (Evy). And it's better to keep your money in three separate places (Evy).

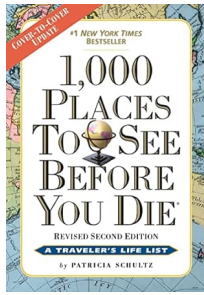


Choosing the right carry-on is important. Karen talked about a lightweight suitcase, and Sandy Patton described a rolling backpack small enough to count as a purse, with underwear in a plastic bag. Of course, underwear is at the top of the list of essentials to pack in a purse or carry-on bag, as well as in checked luggage; a change of clothes was second. In fact, it is possible to pack light, by using a monochromatic colour scheme and rolling up your clothes in a carry-on bag (Karen). Nancy advised us not to bring anything we hadn't worn before.

There were lots of suggestions in the food and drink category, starting with an empty water bottle and small bags of food (Evy). Other nutritious ideas mentioned were granola bars (Nancy), trail mix (Marian), instant grit/oatmeal you can make with the coffee maker in your room (Carroll), dried apples, and breakfast foods such as frozen sausages (Sandy); a supply of suitable foods are especially important for travel day and for those with dietary restrictions.

Participants mentioned several other practical items: a flashlight (Evy and Edna Kelly), an extension cord or power strip (Sandy), a travel hot pot or collapsible kettle (Charlene), and a clothespin to keep the curtains closed—the pins on hangers for pants and skirts can also be used for this purpose (Charlene). And Evy reminded us not to forget our bathing suit!

As well as practical advice, people thought of spiritual and cultural enrichment: devotional material (Rebecca), a journal or daybook and a good travel book (Jo-Anne), and a Kindle with many downloaded books (Rae). You may prefer or need printed materials: books or puzzle books (Jo-Anne), maps (Evy), or copies of your travel information. Most important of all, perhaps is Karen's suggestion to bring a good attitude, to watch for synchronicities or miracles, and to enjoy the unexpected.

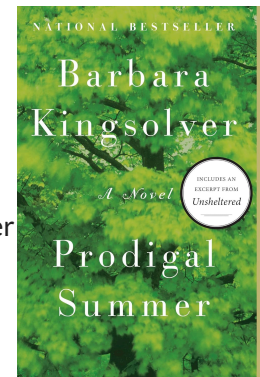


You Might Like to Read...

Prodigal Summer, 2000, by Barbara Kingsolver

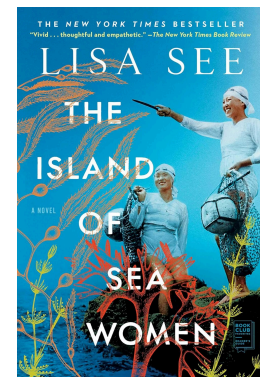

The Island of the Sea Women, 2020, by Lisa See

How long can you hold your breath underwater? It is a multigenerational family saga that will stay with you a long time.

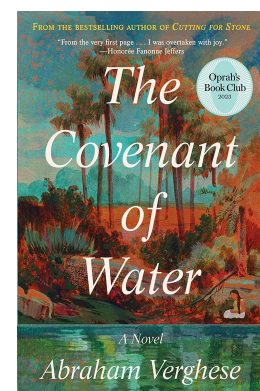

The Covenant of Water, 2024, by Abraham Verghese

Upon first encountering this novel, I was struck by its size. It is a massive book with 82 chapters spanning many years and family trees, starting from 1890 and continuing until the present day or 1970s. Covering both personal and historical events from India, the story is a complex web of characters and traits that can sometimes be challenging to keep track of. As someone who likes to read books over several weeks, I had to keep referring to a list of all the characters to refresh my memory. Thankfully, I discovered a comprehensive list of characters online, which was of great help.

One advantage to listening to the book with the Audible app is that the author narrates it, and he can



pronounce all the specific Indian words and dialects accurately. The book covers many topics: family, friendship, love and beauty, tradition, myths/folklore, medicine and science, youth and aging, birth and death, food and art, racism, religion, and politics. The descriptions of the country, plants, animals, wardrobes, and rivers were vivid and clear.

What does "the covenant of water" mean? You will discover the answer when you read the book and be transported to another culture with intriguing stories. I highly recommend reading *The Covenant of Water*.

Organizing

I know I'm not the only one who has recently dealt with a move that involved downsizing and re-organizing my space. During two discussions that Kay Hoover led at our monthly Happy Hour Chats, many participants shared ideas that were useful for them as they decluttered, modified their "launch pad" or empty nest, adapted to a temporary or long-term intergenerational home, moved into assisted living or long-term care, or reorganizing their home or their schedule.

One of the guiding principles I used to choose what I would keep was to ask myself basic questions: Did I love it? Would I take it to a nursing home? As Marie Kondo proposes, does it spark joy? It is easier to motivate yourself to make decisions if you start with what you want to keep rather than what you need to toss or what can't fit in your new space.

As I learned during our move, different people have different approaches to organizing households. If I were to do it again—though I certainly hope I won't have to do this big a move ever again!—I would carefully pack everything I wanted to take to the new place and mark the boxes with precise labels before sorting the rest. A friend who helped me preferred to proceed room by room, packing or tossing away each item. Others put everything on the floor in piles of keep, toss, give away, and store elsewhere, before putting anything on hangers or in garbage bags.

Organizing time is easier for me than organizing space. Its purpose is clearer to me: to make the best use of my time and energy. I strive to do the most important things first thing in the morning, rather than succumb to the distraction of activities others consider urgent. Establishing a routine to deal with regular chores can be helpful. You can make a simple checklist or schedule daily, weekly, and monthly tasks. Busy families can sit down at the beginning of every week and review upcoming activities. It's a good idea to take care of each piece of mail or email as it arrives or at the same time every day. Use electronic notes, an agenda, or a calendar whiteboard to write everything down; whatever you note in writing is something you don't have to keep in your head.



Some of the travel tips in this issue apply to organizing your daily life as well: a go-to / emergency bag, a pad of paper in your purse and beside your bed, separate bags in the house or boxes in the trunk for frequent activities (looking after a grandchild, going to a meeting, grocery shopping), post-it notes, index cards with lists, visual reminder signs, and hard copies of emergency information. You can print or access electronic checklists for grocery shopping (by aisle), or countdowns for major events like weddings. Organizing your electronic files into folders (Work, Volunteering, Finances) and sub-folders (for instance by volunteer association and then into administration, program, meetings) makes it easy to find things quickly. Books can be shelved by topic, genre, and/or alphabetically by author.

Getting rid of years or generations of accumulated objects takes time. Once you've gone through that experience, keeping from accumulating "stuff" is easier. You can ask yourself if you both need and want each purchase, and then if you need and want to keep it. For instance, if you buy a formal dress for a special occasion, are you likely to wear it again? If not, you can sell or donate it. Having less clutter and keeping the belongings that you love close to you will result in a more open, inviting space. Having a way of dealing with chores and activities that works for you makes daily life less overwhelming. Organization is less a matter of keeping your space and time under tight control, and more about meeting a basic universal need for harmony, beauty, and peace.

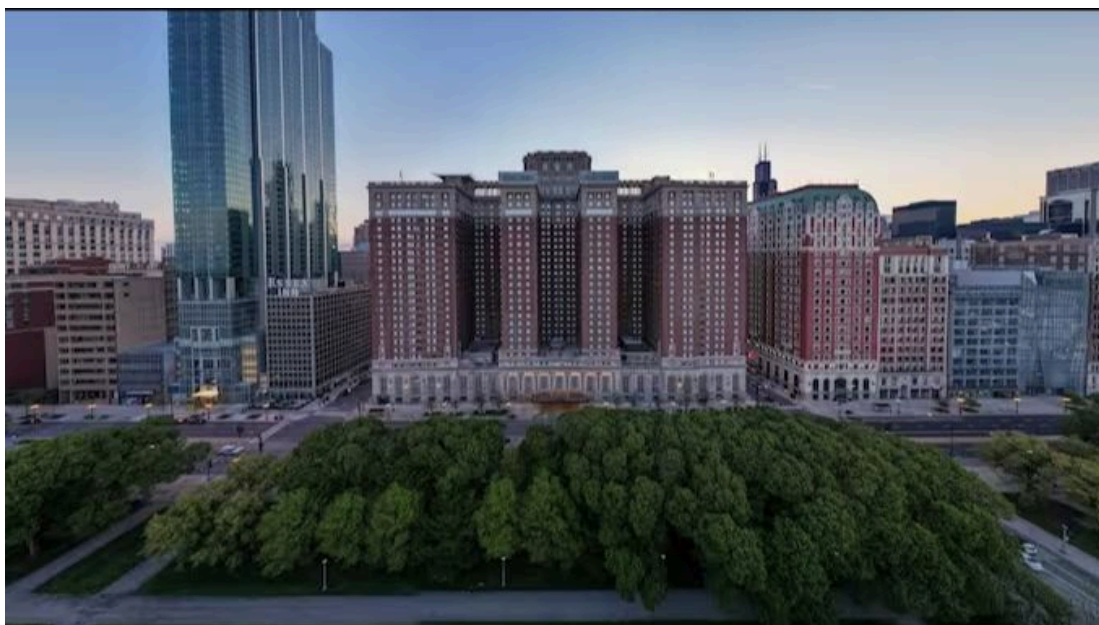

Hotel Accommodations

A room block is reserved for registrants at the Hilton Chicago, venue for several LLLI Conferences over the years, located conveniently downtown at 720 S. Michigan Avenue, Chicago, IL 60605. The Hilton Chicago is a non-smoking hotel.

Our room block includes rooms with one king bed and rooms with two double beds. These rooms are available at the group rate of \$229 per night, plus 11.75% sales tax and 17.4% hotel occupancy tax. Rooms are also charged a destination fee of \$25 per night, which covers complimentary Wi-Fi, access to the hotel's fully equipped Athletic Club and pool, and a daily \$25 food & beverage credit valid at the hotel's restaurant, bar, and lounge. Rooms with two queen beds are available for \$239 per night plus taxes. A limited number of two bedroom parlor suites are available for \$739 per night plus taxes. Rollaway beds can be added to rooms (based on space) for \$40 per night. If you require a room with accessibility to accommodate a disability or special need, please indicate this by checking the box for an accessible room on the online form and/or explain your needs when making your reservation by phone.

For those who wish to explore Chicago on their own before or after our event, the hotel will honor our group rate for reservations from October 20 through October 30. The online link only handles reservations for the core event dates, October 23 through October 27. To reserve rooms before or after the event, reserve over the phone, or use the link to reserve your room for the core dates and call our hotel contact, Noell Riese at 312-431-6910 to reserve the additional days. The hotel is providing space for trip activities based on guaranteed hotel room reservations.

Hotel rooms are equipped with a refrigerator, coffee maker, and safe deposit box. Rooms are serviced daily. A microwave is available in the lobby (at Herb N' Kitchen) for guest use. The hotel Athletic Club features a variety of LifeFitness machines, Peloton bikes, free weights, and other equipment, and dry saunas. The Club is open daily from 6:00 am to 10:00 pm. The swimming pool is open for the same hours; reservations for the pool are requested to meet occupancy capacity limitations. Self-parking is available in the hotel garage for \$69 per night.

The hotel check-in time is 3:00 pm and check-out is 11:00 am. Guests arriving prior to check-in time will be accommodated as rooms become available. The hotel will check baggage as needed on the day of check-in or check-out. Guests who check-out prior to the check-out date on their reservation will be charged an Early Departure Fee equal to one night's room rate plus taxes. To avoid this fee, be certain to notify the hotel of any changes in plans. Room reservations may be canceled for a full refund up to 72 hours in advance of arrival.

More Trip Details

Accessibility

Friends of LLL has checked lodging, transportation, and venues for Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) accessibility. Some places may have uneven surfaces or a few steps, and some locations have separate accessible entrances. If you need special accommodation due to a disability or age-related limitation, please indicate this on your Registration Form. If you wish to bring a helper to assist you with needs, please inform us well in advance. Since we expect this trip to be filled to capacity, we cannot provide free registration for a helper to participate in trip events.

Travel within Chicago

All the downtown Chicago activities for this trip are located within two miles of the Hilton Chicago and can be reached by walking. For those who cannot or would prefer not to walk, the hotel is close to a variety of Chicago transit bus and subway lines. Rideshares are also readily available. On Sunday, the bus to Wilder Park will stop at the Conservatory and will also stop at Wilder Mansion for those who

wish to go directly to the lunch without exploring the Park.

What to Bring

Weather in Chicago in late October can be unpredictable. The historic average shows a high temperature of 60 F and low of 42 F, but our dates show record highs in the 80s and some years with snow on our days! And Chicago often earns its “Windy City” nickname. Layered clothing and appropriate outerwear allows flexibility for changing conditions. Comfortable walking shoes are recommended for the walking tour and for walking through museums and around town. Casual clothing is appropriate for all trip activities except the LLLI Celebration Dinner, where dressier business casual or cocktail attire would be appropriate.
