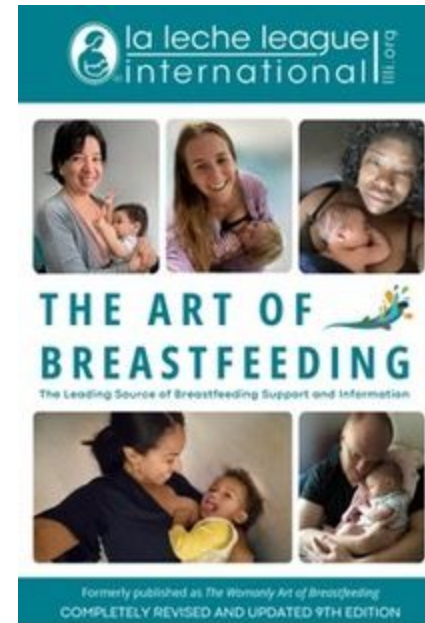
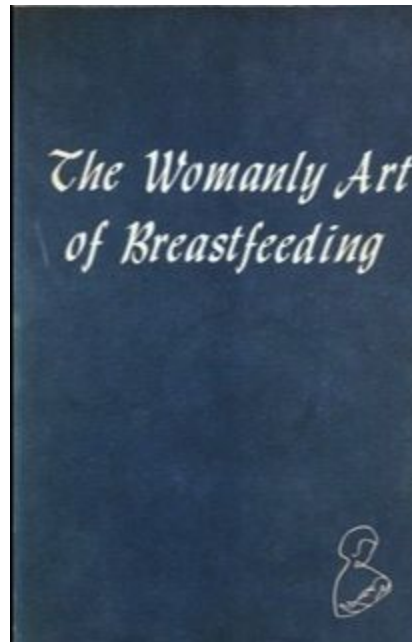

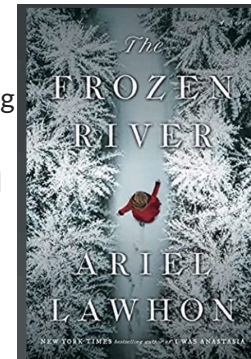
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## You Might Like to Read...

by Carroll Beckham

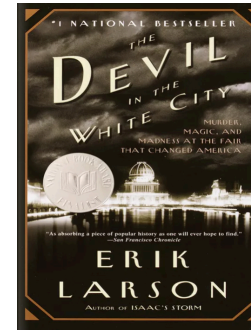
### **The Frozen River, 2023, by Ariel Lawhon**

Based on the actual diary of a Maine midwife and healer in 1789, this is an amazing story with lots of birthing and breastfeeding woven around a mystery. The Kennebec River freezes, entombing a man in the ice. Martha Ballard is summoned to examine the body and determine cause of death. Martha refuses to accept anything less than justice at a time when a woman was not even allowed in a courtroom without her husband present. I think the Friends of LLL will love this book.



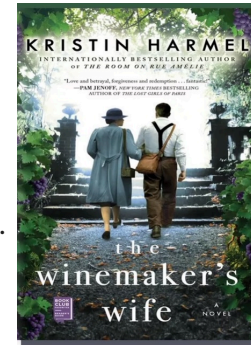
## The Devil in the White City, 2003, by Erik Larsen

This is a true tale of the 1893 World's Fair in Chicago and a serial killer who used the fair to lure his victims to their death. The architect of the fair was David Hudson Burnham, a brilliant man who also built the Flatiron Building in New York and Union Station in Washington, DC. He organized the talents of Fredrick Law Olmstead, Charles McKim, Louise Sullivan and others to transform swampy Jackson Park into the White City. The murderer was Henry H. Holmes, a young doctor who operated a hotel near the fairgrounds, where he tortured his victims and disposed of their bodies. I learned a lot reading this book about the city of Chicago and the World's Fair that changed America and I was reminded that evil has always been among us. An interesting take on the history of the city we will be visiting in October!



## The Winemaker's Wife, 2019, by Kristen Harmel

Love and betrayal, forgiveness and redemption combine in this novel set amid the champagne vineyards of northern France during the darkest days of WWII. You learn much about the making of champagne and the French Resistance from reading this book. A beautiful story with a happy ending sixty years in the making. This story examines how the choices we make in our darkest hours profoundly change our lives and how hope can come from the places we least expect.



## The First Ladies, 2019, by Marie Benedict and Victoria Christopher Murray

This is historical fiction about the partnership between Eleanor Roosevelt and civil rights activist Mary McLeod Bethune, an unlikely friendship that changed the world. Initially drawn together because of their shared belief in women's rights and the power of education, Mary and Eleanor become fast friends through tragedy and triumph. This is the story of two different, yet equally formidable, passionate and committed women and the way their friendship helped form the foundation for the modern civil rights movement.



## And a Book Review with Historical Background

### **The Good Left Undone, 2022, by Adriana Trigiani**

“A family is only as strong as their stories” -- Matelda Rosso

This is an historical fiction about strong women, beautiful settings, laced with humor, family bonds, and trauma in a multi-generational saga. Adriana Trigiani says it took a “long time” to write her twenty-first book. She describes it as “dreamlike” and “magical.”



Carefully researched, this book is inspired by the true story of the attack on the SS Arandora Star, July 2, 1940. Trigiani’s story begins in the cloister garden of St. Andrews Roman Catholic Cathedral in Glasgow, Scotland, where Trigiani was directing a movie. It was there when she saw the memorial for the victims of the SS Arandora Star that she learned of the roundup of Scottish Italians after Mussolini declared war on the Allies. Winston Churchill panicked in his concern to rid the UK of spies, and classified Italian residents of the United Kingdom as enemy aliens. Churchill ordered them to be deported. They offered no resistance to being rounded up, trusting their friends and neighbors, and were imprisoned prior to their deportation.

The Arandora was originally an ocean liner, converted to a cruise ship, and made over to a war ship in WWII. She was torpedoed by a German U-boat and sunk off the coast of Ireland. Eight hundred and five people died in the incident, including four hundred and forty-six Scottish Italians. I had never heard of this horrific event.

As a woman of Italian heritage, I also had no idea there was an Italian diaspora from 1800 to the early 1940s. Italians emigrated to France and Scotland, creating full, rich lives there. Italian immigrants brought calamari, which later morphed into British fish and chips, gelato, and pizza to their new homes. They worked in the food service industry and other service industries, including healthcare. Considered “exotic,” the Italians were “good looking and worked hard,” making them sought after by

high end restaurants as waiters and maître d's.

But later, there was a constant drip of lies and propaganda about Italians and German Jewish intellectuals, considered the “other” for years. Churchill realized he had made a grave mistake and rescinded his enemy alien deportation order six weeks later, but the damage had been done. Loyal and upstanding UK citizens had been deported to Canada, Australia, New Zealand, and the Falkland Islands. This undignified collection of people of Italian descent made me think of how the United States treated Japanese citizens after Pearl Harbor, as well as the current anti-immigrant sentiment.

Trigiani follows the women of several working-class families, primarily the Cabrellis who lived in Viareggio, an Italian resort city on the coast of the Tyrrhenian Sea, known for its famous Carnevale, but had ancestral ties also in France and Scotland; and the Speranzas, a Jewish family from Venice. Both families were gem cutters and jewelers for the Vatican. Prior to WWII, there was little money in cutting gems for the Vatican. Payment was considered to be for “the Honor and Glory of God.” But after WWII, gem cutters grew prosperous.

As often happens, as a family prospers financially, they begin to lose their family identity. Trigiani is a proponent for writing down our family stories: the good, the bad, and the ugly. According to her, half the history of the world has not been recorded due to the fact that women were too busy to record their own stories. Our inheritance is not silver, china or collectibles. Our stories are our true inheritance.

Strong willed matriarch Matelda Cabrelli Roffo is nearing the end of her life and realizes she has kept many secrets from her family. As her days wind down, and her granddaughter Anina faces some of her own questions, Matelda is determined to repair the wrong, sharing her truth with Anina.

Matelda’s mother, Domenica Cabrelli, has her own stories of love and loss which are revealed along the way.

One aspect of the book I particularly enjoyed was that each character had their own distinct voice. They were imperfect people, but very well-developed characters. I cared about the choices they made and how they dealt with circumstances beyond their control. There are many small, vibrant details that bring the story right off the page. I found myself chuckling, “My nana used to say that, too.”

This novel is about how we live and what we leave behind after we go: love, family, loyalty, bravery.

Trigiani weaves together their stories from different times and countries and makes it seem effortless. Father Fracassi, who is a nonfictional person, shares to “reflect on the past (and) make peace with it. You cannot control the evil done to you. You cannot turn back and right the good left undone.” Much to think about.

There are so many layers to this book that I know I missed some of the nuances. As soon as I finished it, I wanted to read it again. It’s that good!



When Domenica is in the French convent, we find her breaking up walnuts for a cherry walnut cake. Some internet digging uncovered a traditional recipe, possibly the one used by Domenica:

*Italian Cherry Walnut Cake – serves 8*  
Has a delicious macaroon texture.

#### Ingredients

- 2 large eggs
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- ½ tsp. salt
- ¾ cup chopped walnuts
- 2 cups fresh pitted cherries
- ½ Tbsp. butter for buttering pan

#### Directions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Lightly butter a 9” springform pan and line bottom with parchment paper.

Lightly beat eggs and add vanilla and sugar. Beat until light and creamy.  
In a separate bowl, sift together flour, baking powder and salt.  
Mix in walnuts and fold into egg mixture.  
Gently fold in cherries.  
Spread cake mixture into bottom of prepared springform pan.  
Bake for 1 hour to 1 hour 20 minutes until golden brown on top and a wooden pick comes out clean.  
Cool on wire rack for 10 to 15 minutes and carefully remove pan.  
Serve warm or cool completely. Top with powdered sugar if desired.

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## Is Storyworth for You?

Did our book review of *The Good Left Undone* inspire you to record your memories for your family and future generations? Are you wondering how you might get started in this endeavor? Some of my friends told me about Storyworth and I love to write, so I decided to give it a try. It's been a lot of fun! Disclaimer: I am not affiliated with Storyworth in any way and I do not receive anything if you decide to use the service.

As one of seven children, my experience provided the motivation to slow down and reflect on my life to date – the joyful and the upsetting. It helped me see how blessed I am. It enabled me to share what life lessons I believe are foundational.

Once a week, I received an email question to jog my memory and encourage me to write. I replied with an email with an answer that was as long or as short as I wanted. At the end of the year, my stories are bound into a keepsake book. That's it, it's that simple.

Storyworth has hundreds of questions from which to choose. You can even write your own if you don't like that week's prompt. A few examples of questions include:

*What things do you think you cannot live without?*

*Do you have any regrets in life?*

*What is one of your fondest childhood memories?*

*What personal expectations do you hold yourself to?*

*If you were to do it over, what would you do differently?*

*Have you ever feared for your life?*

*What was your mother like when you were a child?*

A subscription cost \$99, which is a little pricey, but my children gifted me with my subscription. Yours might, too! At times, you can find a discount code, too. For the subscription fee, you receive weekly

story prompts and then one black and white interior hardcover book. You can order extra copies (\$39 each) for each child/grandchild, if you choose. The books are 6x9 inches, font is Merriweather, size 10, but there are no italics, bolds, or underlines. You can include photographs.

For me, Storyworth was an easy way to set down my memories and life experiences for my children and grandchildren to share. But the important thing, as we learned from the book review of *The Good Left Undone*, is that we DO pass those stories along. Our stories are our family treasures. So even if you get a specific notebook in which to record your thoughts, it is important that you do it. Have fun!

Here's Evy's story: "When our first child was born, we were living in a studio apartment in Greenwich Village in New York City. In front of us was a stunning needlepoint shop called Wool Farm. How delighted I was when Mrs. Berke, the owner of the shop, knocked on the door and presented me with one of her handmade pillows. I said how lovely that would be to put in the baby's carriage. She replied, 'No dear, that's not for the baby; that's for you to put in your rocking chair so you will be comfortable when you nurse your newborn baby.'"

Several members talked about books they had received when they were pregnant or had a newborn, and especially about the *Womanly Art of Breastfeeding*. The blue “manual” was mentioned frequently at the Chat and has been celebrated by our members in our Facebook group. Alice Ziring, who was living in Israel, was given *Nursing Your Baby*, by Karen Pryor, by another American who had lived there. Some participants received correspondence or a newsletter from LLL.

La Leche League publications were affirming and even life-changing for many. Even more so was the gift of LLL Leaders and members, who became life-long friends or supportive co-Leaders. For Nancy Franklin, LLL meant women’s empowerment and giving back; for Kathie Sutherland, connections with lots of women and a rich memory bank; for Harriet Smiley, the power of women supporting women; LLL gave Nancy Sherwood and Nancy Franklin, the gift of learning about Human Relations Enrichment (now Communications Skills Instruction/Development).

Of course, family members like Rae Schopp’s mother-in-law and Nancy Franklin’s “influencers,” who determined, “All Franklins will be breastfed,” are key. LLL and other friends brought Jo-Anne Elder and Carroll Beckham food, support, and sometimes an opportunity to rest.

## **2024 We Remember Ceremony at Wilder Mansion**

We will be honoring all recently deceased Leaders at our We Remember Ceremony on Sunday, October 27 at Wilder Mansion as the culminating part of our Friends of La Leche League trip to Chicago.
