The Backstory of the Friends of LLL Chicago Trip (from someone near to Chicago)

I have gone on many Friends of LLL Trips with my friend (and former DA) retired Leader Charlotte Knopf as my roommate. Many times we would say to each other that if the Friends ever had a trip to Chicago we could help because we live in the Chicago Suburbs.

Well, our wish to help came true! We were able to help with the October 2024 Chicago Trip! But it didn't go exactly as we planned. Here's the backstory.

We worked on our local part of the Friends of LLL Chicago Trip a great deal with the Friends' treasurer, Anne Hutton. Anne lives in Houston, and the Houston area was hit by Hurricane Beryl when we were working on trip plans. Anne would have to travel to her go-to alternate Wi-Fi facility, Taco Cabana, to try and get emails out to Char and me, and the rest of the Chicago Trip team.

As Charlotte was working on the Chicago trip she also had some challenges. She was waiting to get a ride with another retired LLL Leader to go to a local event. It was a rainy day, and she was standing at the top of the tall stairs by her front door. She reached down to get an Amazon package that had been delivered and fell down all of the steps. She broke eight ribs, and her nose, and had bruises everywhere. She was hospitalized and had many weeks of recovery.

I was the caregiver for my husband who had Pulmonary Fibrosis, a disease that causes continuous scarring of the lungs, and has no cure. Many who are diagnosed with this disease are told they have a life expectancy of 3-5 years, and John was at 3.5 years. Forty days before the Friends October 2024 trip, John passed away quickly from a sudden heart attack.

So you can see there was quite a backstory to this trip, and yet the trip went on. And it went on because we had lots of help from LLL Leaders, Friends, and Family.

Before the events listed above happened, all of us on the Chicago Trip team local committee had done a lot of pre-planning. Char and I were in charge of the two tours of the DePaul University LLLI Archives on October 24 and 25, and the final Luncheon on Sunday October 27 at Wilder Mansion in Wilder Park in Elmhurst, Illinois. Wilder Park is the park where Founder Marian Tompson got the idea to start a breastfeeding group!

I am a Leader with a LLL group in the Chicago Suburbs called LLL of Lombard and Wheaton. Two of my co-Leaders, Gabi Reczek and Denise Karhoff King, drove Char and me to do the final planning at the DePaul Archives about two weeks before the trip. There we met with Jamie Nelson, Head of Special Collections and Archives, and Emily Swenson, the Public Services Archivist at DePaul. They went over with us all the wonderful plans they had for the two tours they offered for the Friends who signed up to attend those events.

For the luncheon at Wilder Mansion we had many parts to prepare for. Charlotte and I picked the caterer for the luncheon, and chose the food options. Hoping for a beautiful fall day, we planned to have some of our local committee members give attendees a tour of Wilder Park outside of Wilder Mansion. Outside of the mansion there is the LLL Bench, and many plaques that were placed there to celebrate LLLI's 25th Anniversary. There is also Marian Tompson's tree that was placed there a few years ago by her children.

LLL Leader Sonrisa Parker from LLL of Woodridge, another Chicago suburb, and her family arrived early on Sunday morning October 27 and found the beautiful fall day we had hoped for. She brought pink heart-shaped helium balloons and placed them on the LLL Bench and all the plaques and important places we wanted our visitors to see in the park. Wilder Park also has a Conservatory and gorgeous outside garden, and Sonrisa put balloons along that path to mark the way to those places. Sonrisa and another local LLL Leader, Vicki Anzalone, guided the visitors to the outside visiting areas when the bus arrived to Wilder Park from the Chicago Hilton.

Also before the Sunday visitors from the Chicago Hilton arrived at the mansion. our inside crew was busy. The caterers would arrive at the mansion about 9:30 am and start putting the white tablecloths on the round white tables. Our decorating volunteer, Maria Knopf – daughter of Char Knopf – had planned how to decorate the tables and the rest of the mansion rooms we were using. She decorated everything with fall colors, leaves, and pumpkins. We placed one doll from the LLL Doll Collection on each table, and the rest of the Doll Collection was placed throughout the mansion.

Of course, the local committee had to move the 49 piece Doll Collection from where they were stored at my house to the mansion. Two of my sons helped pack the Doll Collection up the day before and get it to the mansion on Sunday at 9:30 am. A crew of current and retired Leaders met my sons at the mansion and worked feverishly to get the dolls and the decorations into the mansion and displayed before luncheon attendees came in the bus from the Hilton! That committee consisted of Dave and Greg Lebbing, Sharon Barsotti, Sue Steilen, Charlene Lee-Freislinger (local artist and artist

who did the line drawing of Wilder Mansion that was used for the Luncheon Event Program Booklet), and Dr. Mienna Hall (former ACL of Illinois). Retired Leaders Nancy Fako and Cynthia Cuevas helped with other park work. Local LLL of Lombard and Wheaton Leaders Jessica Baker Ewald and Heather Woods also gave much support before the event.

My sons, Dave and Greg, are IT guys and were volunteered by their mom to be there all day to make sure the A/V equipment worked perfectly. Local LLL Leader, Natalie Wetzel, was an attendee at the mansion with her new baby, Gregory David. I made sure we got a picture of Natalie and Baby Gregory David with my Greg and Dave!

A slide show of the LLL Doll Collection was shown continuously in two mansion rooms. Local LLL of Lombard/Wheaton Group Leader, Megan Nunziato, helped with that, and also added the slide show to our group website. To view it go to:

Our Group, LLL of Lombard/Wheaton, raised money and repaired the Doll Collection over the last few years. We are now looking for a place where the collection can be permanently displayed. If you have an idea for a place, please share it with our Group.

Now you know the backstory to the Friends of LLL 2024 Chicago Trip. When a bunch of LLL Leaders and Friends and Family get together we can accomplish what seemed to be, at one time, impossible!

Another Chicago Trip Experience (from someone far from Chicago)

I had the pleasure of joining former Leaders and current long-term Leaders on the Friends of La Leche League trip. This was a smaller gathering than in pre-COVID times. Just over thirty of us attended and were accommodated at the Hilton Hotel in Chicago, looking over a park and beyond to Lake Michigan.

Prior to the trip, participants were encouraged to liaise to share rides from the airport to the hotel, and Judith Elder and I soon spotted each other alongside the baggage

carousel. We had also been encouraged to liaise if we wanted to share a room. My roommate was Judy Canahuati. So making new friends began even before I stepped out the front door.

My main reason for joining this year's trip was that it incorporated a visit to Wilder Park, where the idea of La Leche League began. We travelled by coach and on arrival found local LLL Leaders had marked the sites of various LLL plaques and bench with heart balloons, creating a path to follow. It was a delight to wander through the park in the company of other long-term Leaders and former Leaders. It was easy to picture Marian Tompson and Mary White with their babies at that church picnic back in 1956.

Our luncheon was held in the Mansion. At this function the daughter and grandchildren of Founder Viola Lennon arrived, which was a lovely surprise for us all, and particularly for Marian Tompson. The La Leche League dolls from around the world were displayed throughout the venue.

After lunch the *We Remember* Ceremony was held to honour Leaders who had passed away since the last Friends of La Leche League reading. Susan Mocsny Thomas, Joan Crothers, and Marian Tompson read out each of the names as they appeared on the screen. We were also able to view the *We Remember* book which has their names written in calligraphy.

I had liaised with Jamie Nelson, Head of Special Collections and Archives (SPCA) at DePaul University, during the coordination of the LLLNZ History Project, and I was keen to see La Leche League International collection for myself. Two groups of us travelled to the archives by Uber and, after a brief introduction to the material and an overview of handling instructions, we were free to peruse files we had previously requested to research or simply free to look. La Leche League's archives are vast. It had been advantageous to browse through the inventory prior to the visit and place a specific request for the material I wished to view.

I valued the balance the organizers had apportioned between organised trips and free time. I also chose to join the Architectural cruise. This didn't disappoint. Afterwards, those of us who had participated found ourselves looking at buildings around the city with a new appreciation.

Before the Swallows Come Back, 2023, by Fiona Curnow

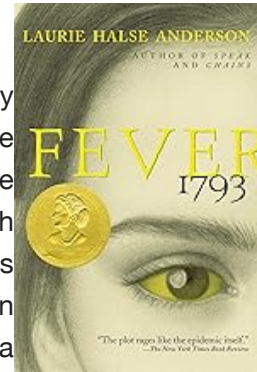

leads to Tommy and Charlotte losing touch. The story follows them as they face their challenges alone and fight for survival and justice.

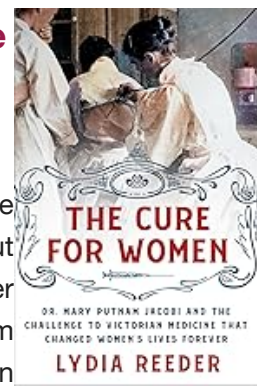
Fever 1793, 2002, by Laurie Halse Anderson

During the summer of 1793, Mattie Cook lives above the family coffee house with her widowed mother and grandfather. Mattie spends her days avoiding chores, but the fever breaks out. Disease sweeps the streets of Philadelphia, destroying everything in its path and turning Mattie's world upside down. At her feverish mother's insistence, Mattie flees the city with her grandfather. But she soon finds that the sickness is everywhere, and she must survive in a world frantic with disease.



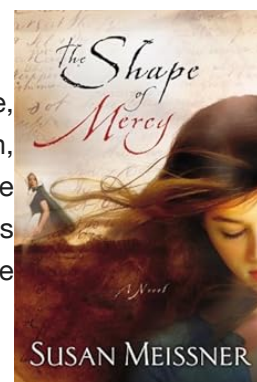
The Cure for Women: Dr. Mary Putnam Jacobi and the Challenge to Victorian Medicine that Changed Women's Lives Forever, 2024, by Lydia Reeder

This is a book which tells how Victorian male doctors used false science to argue that women were unfit for anything but motherhood -- and the brilliant doctor who defied them. After Elizabeth Blackwell became the first woman to graduate from medical school in the United States in 1847, more women demanded to study medicine. Barred entrance to universities, women built their own medical schools and hospitals. Their success spurred a backlash from white male physicians who were obsessed with eugenics and the propagation of the white race. Distorting Darwin's evolution theory, these physicians proclaimed in best selling books that women should never be allowed to attend college or enter a profession because their menstrual cycles made them perpetually sick. Into the midst of this turmoil marched tiny Mary Putnam Jacobi, the first woman to be accepted into the Sorbonne medical school in Paris. As one of the best-educated doctors in the world, she returned to New York and, aided by other women physicians and suffragists, Jacobi conducted the first scientific research on reproductive biology. The results of her studies shook the foundations of medical science and higher education.



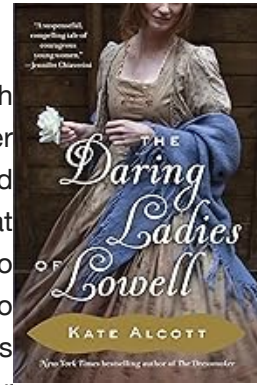
The Shape of Mercy, 2008, by Susan Meissner

Lauren, a college student, helps Abigail, an 80-year-old recluse, transcribe the diary of Abigail's ancestral cousin, Mercy Hayworth, who was hanged for witchcraft centuries ago. As secrets unfold, the extent to which the lives of the three women are connected comes to light, and both Lauren and Abigail find the way they view the world changed.



The Daring Ladies of Lowell, 2014, by Kate Alcott

This historical fiction novel offers a compelling slice of both feminism and Industrial Age history. Eager to escape life on her family's farm, Alice moves to Lowell, Massachusetts in 1832 and throws herself into the hard work of "the mill girls." As conditions at the factory become more dangerous, Alice finds the courage to represent the workers and their grievances. The mill owner pays no heed, but Alice attracts the attention of his oldest son. Alice finds herself torn between her commitment to the girls in the mill and her blossoming relationship with the boss's son. This story is based on the actual murder of a mill girl (Alice's friend) and the subsequent trial in 1833.



After our Chicago Trip in 2024, What's Next?

We had a wonderful time in Chicago last October, and now we are looking forward to making future plans. We have reviewed all the evaluations and it seems that many of you are concerned with more accessibility on future trips. We concur that plans must include options for all levels of mobility.

One option that was mentioned several times was a cruise. Your Board discussed this and realized that we could get many of the things we need on a ship. An LLL Grandmother

I am sitting at my desk looking at the digital picture frame with photos of my sweet grandson. Galileo is my first grandchild and who knows, maybe my only grandchild.

I have been involved in La Leche League ever since my first child, my daughter Courtney, was a baby -- today is her 47th birthday! I became a La Leche League Leader shortly after my daughter reached her first birthday and have continued to be an active Leader all these years.

I had four sons after I had Courtney. All of them nicely spaced three years apart, which I credit with luck and breastfeeding.

As you can imagine, my husband and I were delighted when our son told us that we were going to be grandparents!

This is not my daughter-in-law's first baby. I asked her if she had breastfed before, and she said she had not. I told her that I would support her decision whatever it was. She knows that I am an LLL Leader, so she is aware of my leaning toward breastfeeding.

As the baby's birth got closer, my son and daughter-in-law put together an online baby registry. When I saw "baby bottles" on the list my heart dropped. I was sad.

La Leche League came to my rescue. I told a long time LLL friend and grandmother to many babies about my feelings. I love her answer. She said, "I've been riding that train for a while." Her grandson was not nursing and never had. She assured me that it would be alright, and we just have to learn to keep our feelings to ourselves. So many of my

friends have taught me the expression that many of us have holes in our tongues because we have to bite our tongue so often.

As the birth got closer, I mentioned the bottle feeding to my son and he told me, "She's going to pump." Wow, that was something. I am sure my son was responsible for making sure his son would get breastmilk.

When Galileo was a couple of weeks old, my husband and I babysat so my son and daughter-in-law could go for her postpartum checkup. They left me a bottle of pumped breastmilk. Oh, I was so tempted to put the baby to my breast. I was curious to see if he had any idea what to do. I restrained myself. I gave him a bottle and we did fine.

We don't live close to each other, so we don't see the baby as often as we would like.

All five of our children and their partners and spouses came home for Christmas this year. Meeting the baby was a big draw!

My daughter-in-law told me that she pumped for about five and a half months. Pumping was getting too arduous, and her milk was drying up. I told her that she did a wonderful job, and I was pleased and impressed that she stuck to it as long as she did.

My grandson is eight months old now. He is a chubby, beautiful little boy and he is sprouting his first two teeth.

I truly believe that through all of the LLL work, I have learned to be accepting and meet the parents where they are. How great is that!
